Beyond the Quarter, the New Orleans Museum of Art (1 Collins Diboll Circle) and the Amistad Research Center at Tulane University are worth the trek. But even if your conference activities preclude extensive planned sightseeing, do take a stroll to enjoy the flavor and charm of this sophisticated and diverse city known for the good life!
